Message

"Teach Your Children"

There has been a lot of discussion through the past 40 or 50 years about the damage done when prayer and any other religious observations were removed from the public school systems. I am sure that there are still a few of us who remember saying the Lord's Prayer before class began along with the Pledge of Allegiance. More than a few people over the years have stated removing prayer was the ruination of the youth of America. While I understand the implications of these decisions, I strongly disagree that this is why our youth today don't have faith.

There was a time in this nation when most children learned how to read from the Holy Bible. In many homes, the Bible may have been the only book available. Unless a family lived in a town or city, there were very few schools that were available. Education may have only been accessible through church or from someone in the family who could read the Bible. Somehow, the time came when schools were available and the education of our children was turned over to the professionals. Mother and Father no longer were responsible for the education of their offspring. The attitude soon became one of not paying attention to what was being taught as long as they were learning the basics. It did not take that many years for religious teaching to go out of style. Perhaps if you were involved with a church, the children were given religious training in Sunday School but as church attendance became less and less popular so went religious education. Belief in God is not instinctive behavior.

There seems to be an attitude in America, and this is not new, that says; I don't think I should influence my child in something as personal as faith. I think that they should make up their own minds when they get old enough to decide for themselves. How in the world is a child supposed to make a decision on something as important as faith if they have no foundation to build on? I am not sure that any decision can be made on any topic without a basic understanding or some kind of knowledge in that topic. We teach behavioural skills to children as soon as they are able to understand. Like it or not, it is the responsibility of every parent to instill certain kinds of knowledge in their offspring.

Teaching is a necessary and valuable part of life. We come into this world ignorant, and we must be taught: language proficiency, motor skills, cultural norms, social customs, manners, moral values, all these and more are the product of the learning process of childhood. Since teaching is a key element in acquiring information and developing knowledge, it is not surprising that the Bible has much to say about teaching. Teaching is one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. "We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift . . . is teaching, then teach" (Romans 12:6-7). In this context, teaching refers to the God-given ability to explain God's Word; the teacher has the supernatural ability to clearly instruct and communicate knowledge, specifically the doctrines of the faith and truths of the Bible. "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then workers of miracles, then healers, helpers, administrators, speakers in various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles?" (1 Corinthians 12:27-29)

It is a fact that the sooner a person starts learning about anything, the easier it is to teach them. Of course, the subject matter and method of teaching is directly related to the age of the

one being taught, but good teaching has no age limit. We all know that there are some things that, when taught early on, will tend to stay with us as years go by. Topics such as faith, if not acquired early in life, will not be received as well when a person has already made up their mind because of exposure to environments that dismiss or disparage ideas regarding belief in God or religion. This is not only regarding Christianity but any and all faiths. If the foundations of faith are not developed early, they are so much more difficult to build when the foundation is shaky.

Today, here in this church, we all watched as Amelia Jane Robichaud was baptized into our faith. From my perspective and understanding, baptism is perhaps the wrong word to us. In years past, infants and young children were not baptized, they were Christened. What is the difference? Baptism is when a person professes their faith and acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. Christening is when we dedicate a child to God and promise to see that the child is brought up in a Christian environment. True baptism requires that a person have the maturity and knowledge of what they are doing. Since a child cannot make these decisions on their own, we, as a congregation and the parents and family dedicate ourselves to teach the child all about our faith. When the child reaches the age of reason, they may affirm their baptism or Christening in the service of Confirmation.

I think that the important thing to remember is, we cannot, should not, or expect someone else to educate our children about faith. It is up to each individual parent, family member, or member of a church congregation, to guarantee that our children learn about our relationship with God so that they may grow in the faith that we find so important. Expecting people that you don't really know to explain God to your child may be easier but you lose the experience of introducing your child to the one who loves them as much if not more than you do. It does take some time and dedication but it will pay off in our children's lives. As Crosby Stills and Nash sang; "Teach Your Children." Praise Be to God. Amen.

Rise up and help them in their time of need. Let them know the force of Your unfailing love. In Christ's name, Amen.
